Pentecost, which we celebrated just a few days ago, is the moment when the followers of Christ, are finally, irresistibly, inspired by the Holy Spirit.

Fifty days after Jesus' resurrection at Easter, and just ten days after his ascension, they are huddled again, together in 'the Upper Room,' contemplating their next move

Almost all are incapable at that age of consistently thinking about our life, much beyond the next few hours or days.

So, we follow their rules (especially the social ones): don't stand out, don't leave the safety of the herd.

However, the four years of High school is the time when we all begin to change in this regard.

And it doesn't take long for a more resistant, defiant spirit, to present.

These are the early adopters, who, even as freshmen, begin to resist against those norms and rules.

I gaze with no small measure of admiration upon the early adopters in the class of 2023.

They knew something was up, following someone else's rules (especially the school rules) feels wrong.

Oh, how many times in the past four years, have I heard from a student: "why do I have to do that, Mr. Susank? That is stupid."

Well, you may not believe me (and admittedly, I do often need to remind myself in these moments) but this is an AWESOME conversation.

'Why?' indeed?

'Why do we have that rule?'

'Why do I need to be on time?'

'Why do I need to dress modestly?'

'Why do I need to work so hard?'

'Why are you so up tight?'

'Why do you put so much emphasis on grades?'

'Why do you put so much emphasis on college?'

Yes, I cheer (quietly to myself of course). Seek those answers! Scrutinize those rules! Question them, challenge them, demand an explanation, demand multiple explanations. That is the <u>truth</u> that you are seeking, Amen and Alleluia!

Because we adults, the unspoken secret we all guard, is that blindly following someone else's rules IS appropriate for children.

Well, graduates, today is the day.

Very shortly, class of 2023, you get to write some of your own rules.

And to decide for yourself, what are the rules by which that you choose to be governed?

Yes, to blindly follow a rule is the stuff of childhood. But caution.... to live without rules is not a good idea.

'but Why Mr. Susank?'

Hopefully, we, your MCP community have given you clear sight, so that you can peer into your own future.

Behold, and you can begin now to see, who you are today, is not who you will be tomorrow. Who you are tomorrow, is not who you will be in a decade. In this real sense, you, me, all of us, we are not just one person. We are each a community of people. That community is ourselves-today, but also our self at age 80, and every day in between.

The rules that you write should be thought of as the guardrails on the road to the person you wish to become; and they will be anchored in the answer to your ultimate 'why?'

'Why do I exist' and 'what am I called to do?' and 'who do I wish to become?'

What we, who care so much for you, have endeavored over these past four years is to help each of you build an answer to that question of 'why?'

It is, our hope that when you return to these existential questions, the answers will echo to you from your every experience at MCP and at home-

That you are loved

That you are wonderfully made

That in this life, your capacity for growth never ceases

That you, and you alone, have a unique role to play in this
flawed and beautiful life

That you are called to live a life for others, including in service to your future self

That, who you truly are, your soul, endures beyond this life, That you have a calling to exist for all eternity with God in heaven

So, reflect at this moment, as the primary author of your life, at this time of Pentecost, of launch, of Commencement, reflect with one eye on who you are now, and more importantly one eye upon who you are still called to be.

Believe in who you are now, and with even greater conviction, in your future self.

Love who you are now, and even more deeply, who you are going to become.

Remember, as the Jesuit scientist, Pierre Teilhard de Chardin dared to proclaim, that "we are not human beings having a spiritual experience. We are spiritual beings having a human experience."

And so, choose your rules that will bolster the unshakable hope, that regardless of what this life presents to you, you are destined to everlasting life, with God in heaven.

Class of 2023, like the disciples at Pentecost, the Holy Spirit is an unquenchable spark.
